

Construction Ahead....

A few words from your Senior Warden

What comes to mind when you hear those words? Inconvenience, slowdowns, roadblocks, expense, messiness, just to name a few. Well I want to talk about a different kind of construction ahead. It began about 10 months ago. Ok, in earnest about 3 months ago, but groundwork had to be laid.

When I took on the job of Senior Warden back in January, I was very troubled by the rather large budget deficit, and dwindling attendance, and a few other things, but these were the biggest of my concerns. I know I was not alone with those concerns. The vestry, which I must say, is a very dedicated group of people who really do have what is best for St. Peter's at heart, has been putting in a lot of extra hours working on those concerns.

One offshoot of our extra meetings has been the realization that even though we might know names, in some cases that is even questionable, and we might know some things about one another, there is a disconnect in our overall relationships with one another, and with Father John. Here's where you might want a hard hat.... "construction ahead"! To help build up those relationships, the vestry has decided to host a series of socials. They will be small group gatherings with Father and a vestry member, where we can engage in some small group discussions, and get to know one another a little better. The vestry had the first social this past Sunday with the backdrop of the Packers-Cowboys game. We had lots of chatter, laughter, and came away feeling a little more connected.

Another offshoot comes with the help of Bishop Matt. We have been in discussion with him as well, as we have been going through the year. He recommended we meet with Gary Manning, who is the Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in Wauwatosa, and a consultant with ChurchWerkes, LLC, who works with churches who are going through various difficulties. We had one introductory meeting with him so far, and plan to continue. One good take away from the first meeting is that he sees HOPE, he sees that we are not dead or dying! As of this writing he is drafting a proposal designed specifically for us, which the vestry will take up at our October business meeting.

The more we connect, the more we learn to share our stories the more we come together as the parish family that St. Peter's has always had. This family in turn, will be better equipped to invite others to join in, and share in our family, and thus we can grow. So please pay attention to announcements, emails, and any other form of communication as we work to rebuild and re-connect. There might be some other changes as we grow and build, but change isn't always a bad thing. There's a bright future for St. Peter's. I hope we can all enjoy the ride!



We can have a better sense of the seven parts of the spiritual life called the Way of Love.

Why should I go to the Revival? *All* of us are seeking a deeper and richer relationship with Jesus Christ. We may be at different places in that journey, but we all need inspiration and refreshment to encourage us on the way. You'll find a lot of joy and excitement there.

What should I expect at the Revival? You will hear some dynamic preaching from our Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. You'll feel connected to him and to the message of Christ's love that he will share in exciting ways. The music and singing will lift your heart in amazing ways. There will be an opportunity for prayer and reflection. And there will be teaching and learning on how to put the Revival lessons to work as you go.

What should I expect *from* the Revival? You may have a strong sense of renewed faith and trust in God. The life of prayer may be livelier, and worship more exciting. You may have a hunger for the Word, finding joy and excitement in the reading of Scripture. You may have healing in relationships and greater energy to accomplish great things for God. There are so many outcomes you can expect from a Revival—but you have to get yourself *to* the Revival to experience what God can do and how God can work in your life!

WAY OF LOVE

THE WAY OF LOVE: REST

REST: Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. – John 14:27

Blessed are you, O Lord ... giving rest to the weary, renewing the strength of those who are spent. (Book of Common Prayer, p. 113)

From the beginning of creation, God has established the sacred pattern of going and returning, labor and rest. Especially today, God invites us to dedicate time for restoration and wholeness - within our bodies, minds, and souls, and within our communities and institutions. By resting we place our trust in God, the primary actor who brings all things to their fullness. For Reflection Rest: Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration

A Note from Fr. John: These days, it's hard to get some rest. We live in a 24/7 world. We Americans are not good at shutting off our devices for a while, or observing a Sabbath rest, or taking all of the vacation time that our employers give to us. I own up to that lack of rest, When I was a boy growing up in Evanston, Illinois,

I learned about "blue laws". Evanston was shut tight on Sundays. Almost nothing was open. No alcohol was sold or served. But one place my family lived was about a half block away from the northern border of Chicago. On the south side of Howard Street, not only was there a different city. The neighborhood was primarily Jewish. *Everything* was open on Sundays—the variety store, the soda fountain, and the bowling alley. There was plenty to do on Sundays—but hardly anything on Saturdays, for I learned that this day was the Jewish Sabbath. Depending on which side of the street I walked, there was something to do *every* day, one side or the other.

I've had to "un-learn" that lesson. A day of Rest: the Sabbath that God himself observed after six days of creation, is essential for physical, mental and spiritual health. Over the years, I have learned that it's *easier to love* when you're well-rested. I pray that you will allow yourself some Rest.

A WORD FROM THE RECTOR

Have you ever heard a good storyteller? Before movies, television and the internet, we used to gather together to hear a storyteller who could spark our imaginations, bring laughter or tears, and teach us some life lessons.

In other times, we'd gather as a family to hear tales of heroes or villains Amon among our ancestors. In the early days of radio, dramas and comedies for children or for adults would be broadcast on major networks. We'd gather in the parlor or living room to listen. and see in our minds some of the scenery or live in the drama of the moment. Not long ago, Cindy and I were listening to the Grand Ol' Opry, just like our grandparents did in the day—except that we were listening on one of Spectrum's music channels via satellite through our smart TV. Weird....

Stories have characters, settings, actions, decisions, and a climax of some kind. You and I are walking stories. We all have histories, events and people who have made us who we are today. People of faith also have stories of how God became real in a moment in time. Some of us have stories about a conversion experience. Others of us can tell of how God provided for our needs when we were struggling to makes ends meet. Others can talk about family and friends who made a positive and holy impact on our life—or some who were negative and hurtful from whom we were able to escape with God's help.

So, how do we start shaping a story we have to tell about God's real presence in our lives? The Bible always is a great place to begin. The gospels are filled with stories of how Jesus had a life-changing impact on them. Recently, in the Wednesday morning Bible study, we read through Exodus 3:1-6, the story of Moses' encounter with the burning bush, and then hearing the voice of an angel who called him by name. That story wasn't simply made up. No doubt Moses told it to remind people how God called him from tending sheep to the great cause of leading the people of Israel out of Egypt to the Promised Land. For some of us, that's a starting point: when have we had a burning bush experience in our lives, a moment that opened us to God?

When we have a story to tell of God's real presence in our life, then we have a way to share with another person, one on a spiritual search. The story may give them a "peg" where they can hand their interest. This way, we're not shoving Bible verses at them or save a soul for another hash mark on the church wall. We are inviting another into our life to walk with us, and for us to walk with them, so that they can meet Jesus. And, as we come to know them spiritually, we can invite them to church also.

Let the Holy Spirit develop your faith story. Learn how to tell it. And rejoice as you remember how God has become real in your life, and that you are now a part of the dominion of God.
